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EXECUTIVE LETTER

2015 was an important year for the Garrison Diversion Conservancy District (Garrison Diversion). We continued to provide vital services and programs that help meet North Dakota's water needs, and, after years of preliminary planning, we took further steps that will lead to the future construction of the Red River Valley Water Supply Project (RRVWSP).

And that's just the tip of the iceberg.

Agriculture and Natural Resources

Garrison Diversion has always been dedicated to providing a reliable water source for agriculture, which has resulted in many irrigation projects over the years. In 2015, we completed the Mile Marker 49 Irrigation Project, the Mile Marker 10 Irrigation Project and the Water Service Contract for the Mile Marker 1.7 Irrigation Project. We also continued assisting with the maintenance of some of our state's important wildlife areas.

Operations and Maintenance (O&M)

The O&M team is responsible for ensuring that the Garrison Diversion Unit's (GDU) Principal Supply Works operate reliably. Thanks to the staff's proven expertise, they also regularly assist other agencies and organizations with operations and maintenance at major facilities like the Jamestown Dam and Devils Lake Outlets.

Recreation

For years, our Matching Recreation Grant Program has provided funds to support local recreation projects in communities across our district. In 2015, Garrison Diversion awarded \$282,097 to 24 projects in our member counties.

Municipal, Rural and Industrial (MR&I)

Garrison Diversion is committed to supporting MR&I projects across the state. Last year, we developed 26 drought management plans and 26 water conservation plans for local communities. We also awarded \$10.1 million from the MR&I Fund in cooperation with the State Water Commission (SWC) for water system expansions.

This is just a snapshot of some of the important projects Garrison Diversion worked on over the past year. I couldn't be more proud of what we accomplished in 2015 as my first year as the General Manager. I look forward to continuing our important work in the years ahead.

The 2015 Annual Report is full of articles that demonstrate the ways Garrison Diversion is working to provide North Dakotans with a reliable, high quality and affordable water supply. Thanks for reading.

AGRICULTURE AND natural resources

Agriculture remains an important element of Garrison Diversion's foundation. In 2015, we continued to support irrigation development across the state by developing or constructing irrigation projects, providing funding for agricultural and irrigation research and development through the ND Irrigation Association and the NDSU Oakes Irrigation Research Site (OIRS).

In addition, the McClusky Canal in central North Dakota has become a valuable resource to several farmers looking to develop irrigation on their farmland. Garrison Diversion continued the McClusky Canal Irrigation Project by completing the 220-acre Mile Marker (MM) 49 Irrigation Project and the 200-acre MM 10 Irrigation Project. In addition, a water service contract was secured for the 550-acre MM 1.7 Irrigation Project.

Garrison Diversion also spent a significant amount of time developing a Master Irrigation Plan to address how irrigation development can be maximized along the canal in the future.

Garrison Diversion continued to invest in the development of the OIRS Expansion Plan. The OIRS is a vital research site providing invaluable data to farmers across North Dakota. In order to assist the OIRS, Garrison Diversion purchased five acres of land and facilitated the purchase of a used plot combine and a linear irrigation system with help from our research partners, the ND Soybean Growers and the ND Corn Growers.

Garrison Diversion also worked to maintain, enhance and protect North Dakota's natural resources by assisting with maintenance at the Audubon and Arrowwood National Wildlife Refuges, Lonetree Wildlife Management Area and various Fish and Wildlife tracts.







OPERATIONS AND maintenance

Working cooperatively with the Bureau of Reclamation (BOR), the Garrison Diversion O&M crew kept the existing GDU facilities in good working condition. The GDU facilities include the McClusky Canal, New Rockford Canal and Oakes Test Area.

Garrison Diversion maintains O&M employees in four locations – Carrington, New Rockford, Oakes and McClusky. The staff includes a professional engineer, master electrician, certified diesel mechanic, painting and coating specialists, vegetative management specialists and multiple heavy equipment operators. Garrison Diversion also retains a large fleet of equipment with dozers, loaders, backhoes, trucks and excavators, and many specialized pieces that allow for work in a variety of situations.

"We had a great year for getting our work done, whether completing special projects or routine tasks," said Kip Kovar, District Engineer. "We have an excellent staff that is very capable of doing whatever work is asked of them. The weather cooperated when we needed it to in order for us to keep our work on track."

One large undertaking in 2015 was coating the inside of the #2 discharge pipe at the Snake Creek Pumping Plant (SCPP). The discharge pipe runs from the SCPP underneath Hwy 83 into Lake Audubon and is approximately 12 ft in diameter and around 800 ft long. The complex project took three to six employees nearly two months to complete.

Expertise in canal maintenance, earth moving and other construction areas enables the O&M staff to assist federal and state government agencies. Cooperative agreements with the SWC, BOR, ND Game & Fish and U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service benefit everybody involved.

The O&M crew assisted the SWC with monitoring and operating the Devils Lake Outlets, along with water sampling, mowing and spraying as part of routine operations at the Devils Lake Outlets. The crew also helped the BOR complete specialty concrete repairs at Jamestown Dam.

Garrison Diversion also completed O&M on irrigation facilities within the McClusky Canal Irrigation Project, which includes pumping stations and delivery pipes.







RED RIVER VALLEY WATER SUPPLY

The need for a reliable and sustainable water supply in the Red River Valley is real. The RRVWSP will help meet the water supply needs of the users in the Valley and along the pipeline route to ensure the continued prosperity of central and eastern North Dakota.

Over the course of the year, significant progress was made on the RRVWSP. We are excited about the level of interest expressed by legislators during the 2015 session. They appropriated \$12.3 million for the 2015-2017 biennium and have indicated future legislative intent to help fund the actual development of the RRVWSP. The funding set the stage for the completion of conceptual design work. Garrison Diversion also implemented multiple task orders as part of the conceptual design phase of the RRVWSP:

Missouri River Intake Investigation

Baldhill Creek Investigation

- Horizontal Alignment
- Horizontal Collector Well Conceptual Design
- Hydraulic and Pump Analysis
- Water Treatment Plant

In 2015, the Missouri River Intake Investigation was completed.

Garrison Diversion also hosted "When the Valley Turns Dry" water conference to educate the public on the monumental project. The conference focused on the RRVWSP and the need for a supplemental water supply in eastern North Dakota. In 2015, Garrison Diversion also provided administrative support to the Lake Agassiz Water Authority, including facilitating meetings and providing legal and engineering services.

Recreation opportunities across the state are valued by residents and visitors of North Dakota alike. Garrison Diversion is proud to bring value to our state by offering the Matching Recreation Grant Program. The program distributes 20% of Garrison Diversion's one-mil levy to eligible projects within the district.

In 2015, Garrison Diversion's Matching Recreation Grant Program awarded funds to help communities provide safe park equipment for children and grandchildren, multi-use paths to get the blood flowing and new campsites designed to help people kick back and relax for the weekend. A total of \$282,097 was awarded to 24 projects within the district, allowing many communities to expand or enhance recreation opportunities offered for residents and visitors.

In addition, the program expended over \$320,000 to previously approved recreation projects. To date, over \$4 million has been expended on recreation projects.

MUNICIPAL, RURAL AND industrial

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Garrison Diversion's mission is to provide a reliable, high quality and affordable water supply to benefit the people of North Dakota. The state MR&I program, jointly administered by Garrison Diversion and the SWC, provides funding to deliver quality water throughout the state. In 2015, \$2.1 million was distributed through the MR&I program to help water systems deliver high quality and affordable water to homes, businesses and farms. An additional \$10.12 million was awarded to other MR&I projects across the state.

Garrison Diversion also provided funding to the ND Rural Water Systems Association to assist with the completion of 26 drought management plans and 26 water conservation plans for communities in North Dakota.
